Senior Maria-Salome Gonzalez remembers the day the COVID struck our community. COVID-19 is an infectious disease caused by a newly discovered coronavirus. Beginning at 11:59 p.m., on March 24, 2020, a Stay Home, Work Safe Order would be in effect within San Antonio city limits per Mayor Ron Nirenberg and Judge Nelson Wolff to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. Before the Stay Home Order news, Providence issued another week of spring break, giving the impression we would be able to return once that week was over. Quarantine by definition is a period of isolation to prevent the spread of infection. From a student's perspective, we were bound to return to life before COVID-19 sooner rather than later.

Faith Hernandez 22' says "Our two-week spring break turned into a two-year ongoing adaptation, not only to a completely different schedule but a way of living our day to day lives. Our everyday schedules took a halt for about six months filled with uncertainty of the new 2020-2021 school year." Google chat and Google meet now became a part of our lives. Fridays were no longer school days but were used for extracurricular meetings and for class tests. Assignments and courses were now self-paced and all assignments were due on Sundays. Continuing with our Junior year, online classes became an option. Only about 10% of the student body went back to in-person classes. This year was kind of a "wing it" year. Everything changed and now we had to adaptwinging it- not only to the political events but also to how the way of education was changing.

Tatyana Ramon who is also a senior found the adjustment challenging. She says, "It was hard to have events during the pandemic. One of the main events that affected us the most was our school dances. Semi-formal had to be held outside by Central Catholic. We were required to wear masks and we had to distance ourselves from each other." 

The Fundraiser Approval Form, despite the title, is the template used to bring forth any event that is being proposed by a class, Campus Life organization or group/individual on Campus.


All information should be completed and submitted to the Campus Life Director at the General Student Council/Campus Life Monthly Meeting; for the 2021-22 school year, that person is Elise Denoux. If necessary, the CLD will submit it to the Administration for review.

Students are encouraged to submit the form at least two weeks prior to the event for consideration and approval of any proposal.

Any Club/Organization that has an approved budget with the School may request a Fundraiser. Once approve, all funds requests and maintenance requests are the responsibility of the Sponsor/Head Advisor, along with the students proposing the event

As funds are collected, the faculty sponsor deposits the money to the Business Office by "COB" (that means by "Close of Business") each day.




High School Bowling By: Tatyana Ramon '22
